



Check out the latest from the Office of Diversity, Inclusion & Equity!

Nikole Hannah-Jones, creator of "The 1619 Project," spoke at Lehigh on October 11 about that Pulitzer Prize winning publication, the backlash against it and what that means, in her mind, for the future of the country. "The 1619 Project" was named for the year the first enslaved Africans arrived in America and was published in The New York Times Magazine in August 2019, in recognition of the 400th anniversary of the first slave ship's arrival. A multi-media undertaking, the project included essays, photos and art by Black American writers, activists and more. "The 1619 Project" sparked controversy, with some historians arguing that it misrepresented the causes of the American Revolution and distorted the legacy of Abraham Lincoln, among other criticisms. "The 1619 Project' is really about memory," Hannah-Jones said. "How do we collectively remember our country and understand our country? What are the things we are taught?" 
